Orange County Historian's Office Announces 2012 Grant Recipients

Village of Florida and Florida Historical Society Among Grant Recipients

Goshen - Orange County Executive Edward A. Diana and Historian Cornelia W. Bush are pleased to announce the recipients of the 2012 Orange County History grants. A total of \$16,600 is being awarded to 33 different recipients from throughout Orange County.

This year's projects include historic preservation, archives development and management, conservation and restoration of art and artifacts, and activities related to the commemoration of the American Civil War, in which Orange County residents participated. Seven properties on the New York State and National Registers of Historic Places are included among this year's grant recipients.

"Orange County has a rich and vibrant history that has contributed to the fabric of our nation from its earliest days," said County Executive Diana. "Through these grants we are able to do our part to preserve and promote that history for future generations."

The Orange County History grants program was begun in 1983 by then-County Executive Louis Heimbach and Historian Colin Faulds as part of the County's $300^{\rm th}$ anniversary celebration.

"2012 marks the anniversaries of a number of significant events in our County's history, including the 150th anniversary of Orange County residents first entering the American Civil War," said Historian Bush. "We appreciate the County Executive's ongoing support as we work to share this history with others. There are numerous exciting projects being undertaken by local historical organizations, and I look forward to working with this year's recipients to preserve and to share our history with residents and visitors to our beautiful region," continued Ms. Bush.





Operation Safe Stop

Operation Safe Stop Education and Enforcement Day April 18

On Wednesday April 18, 2012 law enforcement officers around the state will participate in an Operation Safe Stop day. During "Safe Stop," police officers are on board school buses and in marked and unmarked patrol units on selected bus routes that have a history of illegal passing complaints. Police will issue tickets to drivers who pass stopped school buses (Section 1174 of the Vehicle & Traffic Law).

What is Operation Safe Stop?

Operation Safe Stop seeks to promote school bus safety through education and enforcement efforts. Operation Safe Stop is a cooperative project supported by the New York State Governor's Traffic Safety Committee, the New York State Education Department, the New York Association for Pupil Transportation, the New York State School Bus Contractors Association, the student transportation industry and state, county, city and local law enforcement agencies. The goal of Operation Safe Stop is to proactively educate motorists about the dangers of passing stopped school buses.

Did You Know:

An estimated 50,000 motor vehicles illegally pass New York State school buses every day.

Yellow lights mean the bus is going to stop. Slow down!

Red lights mean students are getting on or off the bus.


STOP! STOP! STOP!

The Law Says:

- It is illegal—and very dangerous—to pass a stopped school bus when the large red lights located on top of the bus are flashing. Flashing lights mean the bus is picking up or discharging students.
- You must stop whether you are approaching the school bus from the front or overtaking it from the rear.
- You must always stop for flashing red lights, even on divided and multilane highways and on school grounds.
- The first-time fine for illegally passing a school bus is a \$250 to \$400 fine, 5 points on your license, and/or possibly 30 days in jail.
- Worse yet, the memory of hitting or killing a child may be one you carry for the rest of your life!

Penalties for Passing a Stopped School Bus:

	Minimum Fine	Maximum Fine	Possible Imprisonment
First Conviction:	\$250	\$400	Up to 30 days
Second Conviction (within 3 years):	\$600	\$750	Up to 180 days
Third or Subsequent Convictions:	\$750	\$1,000	Up to 180 days

The dock was first introduced into the lake in September 2011 and a dedication ceremony was held in October 2011. The dock is back in the lake for the spring, summer, and fall months for the community to enjoy.





Seward's school spirit has been evident in other arenas this year. The Student council used their funds to purchase a Spartan mascot to promote spirit at sporting events




Stolen GEB Dog Replaced by Area Businesses





FOCUS ON WELLNESS

What does your gut tell you?

When you were trying to make a decision, do you recall someone asking: "What does your gut tell you?" Or urging you to "go with your gut?" Checking in with your gut can provide important clues to the quality of your overall health. Think of your gut as the center of your immune system.

Everything you eat and drink, every thought you think, every feeling you have, goes through your gut. If you eat and drink well, your gut can digest and utilize all the nutrients that your body needs to function. That is, of course, if your stress level is under control. In this article, let's focus on how you can use foods to help your gut thrive. I am sure that you have heard of "probiotics," by now. Yogurt is an excellent probiotic. If you ever have to take "antibiotics," eat yogurt for the entire course of the medicine. If you are a woman, antibiotics can create a yeast infection because they kill ALL bacteria, the bad and the good. Kefir is a delicious drink that is also excellent for gut health.

Besides "probiotics," there are also "prebiotics." When you think of "prebiotics," think fiber, which most of us get too little of in our daily diet. Simply put, both pre and pro keep the good gut flora growing, which is what you want.

So, where do we find "prebiotics?" One of my favorite mucilage fiber sources is okra. It is great sautéed in olive oil with garlic and sea salt. We put it in our traditional New Orleans gumbo. Another favorite is flax seeds. I throw a handful into the pan of almost anything that I sauté. I sprinkle them on salads. They have a nice nutty taste. Chia seeds, psyllium, fenugreek (an Indian seed seasoning), kelp, aloe vera, and agave are also sources of mucilage. Further, I can tell you that the herb slippery elm is a fabulous system and gut soother. I mix slippery elm powder in a little water and drink it down. You can also make little balls to keep in a tin, by mixing the powder with a little honey until it is of dough consistency, then roll it into balls. I have used this herb to quiet most stomach ailments and also as a preventive measure prior to holiday indulgence. Your gut also loves fermented foods like sauerkraut, pickles, olives, tempeh, miso, soy sauce and kimchi. This list of beneficial foods is by no means exhaustive.

I encourage you to do a little research and experimentation on your own, to find which foods seem to work best for you. One piece of advice: just try new foods a little at a time. Remember: a thriving gut doesn't live on prescription or OTC drugs. There is no acid reflux, no constipation, no diarrhea, no pain. If you have such symptoms that persist, see your health care provider, sooner rather than later. Your health depends on it!

The Cancer Control Connection

April is Cancer Control Month, but what exactly is cancer control? It's about making changes to things you can control, like diet and exercise, so you can greatly lower your risk of cancer. Research shows that one third of cancer cases are linked to poor diet, physical inactivity, and carrying too much weight. Along with quitting smoking, the top three things you can do to reduce your cancer risk are related to these three controllable behaviors:

- 1. Achieve or maintain a healthy weight.
- 2. Eat a healthy diet.
- 3. Be physically active.

Control Your Weight

Being overweight can increase the risk of cancer and chronic diseases such as diabetes and heart disease. Cancer risk is increased when excess weight causes the body to produce and circulate more of the hormones estrogen and insulin, which can stimulate cancer growth. A good way to see if you are at a healthy weight is to have your doctor check your body mass index (BMI). BMI measures the relationship of your weight to your height. A healthy weight is considered a BMI below 25. Get started with simple steps to help achieve a healthy weight:

- Limit portions sizes
- At meals, make ½ of your plate fruits and vegetables. They also make great snacks
- Limit excess calories from sugary beverages
- Read food labels and limit products that are high in saturated fat, trans fat, sodium and added sugar.

Control Your Diet

Nutrient-rich foods contain essential vitamins, minerals and antioxidants all of

which have been shown to help prevent cancer. Since all foods contain a different mix of nutrients, it's important to




eat a varied and balanced diet. Take a look at your diet to see how you can add more of these foods to your meal plan.

- Fruits and vegetables, including beans and legumes. Whether their fresh, frozen, dried or canned, aim for a serving at every meal and snack. Not only are they full of fiber, vitamins and minerals they're also low in calories – helping you to manage your weight.
- Whole grains. They contain more fiber, which has been shown to help prevent certain cancers such as colon and rectal cancers. Half of the grains you eat each day should be whole grains. Read labels and look for the word "whole" in the ingredient list.
- Low-fat dairy. Three servings of low-fat milk and dairy foods help provide you with the calcium and vitamin D your body needs.

Control Your Activity

Increasing your activity plays a role in cancer prevention since it helps you achieve or maintain a healthy weight. The American Cancer Society recommends that healthy adults get at least 30 minutes a day of intentional moderate vigorous activity at least 5 days a week. Intentional means over and above everyday activities like using the stairs at your office or doing housework. For kids, the recommendation is 60 minutes or more at least 5 days a week


